I am thrilled to introduce this edition of *The Hill* magazine with some important news. We have now officially completed the quiet phase of McDaniel College's Reaching New Heights comprehensive campaign, having surpassed the 80% fundraising mark, raising over \$40.6 million toward our total \$50 million goal! Thanks to the remarkable generosity of so many, the visible impacts — both on campus and off — are already inspiring.

Your gifts have enabled us to design and build the innovative Learning Commons @ Hoover Library, which centralizes our student-facing academic services into one convenient location. Additionally, construction has begun on state-of-the-art facilities for McDaniel's new Nursing program, located at Carroll Hospital, as well as faculty offices in Lewis Recitation Hall for our growing Business and Economics program.

The recently completed Richard A. Clower '50 Track at Gill Stadium and the in-progress renovations to Harvey Stone Park & Pavilion will greatly enhance our outdoor spaces for Environmental Studies majors, track athletes, and the community as a whole.

But the impact of this campaign extends far beyond the enhancement of physical spaces. As you'll read in these pages, campaign giving has already resulted in the establishment of crucial scholarships that enable more students to experience the life-changing impact of a McDaniel education. My husband, David, and I have joined other major gift donors in supporting experiential learning opportunities for students, resulting in increased access to student-faculty summer research projects, study abroad, internships, and volunteerism.

As we launch into the public phase of our campaign, I am also excited to announce the receipt of the largest gift in the college's history, made through the estate of Jonas Eshelman '50. This endowment will enable us to significantly invest in academic excellence — both now and into the future.

Still, there is more transformational work ahead.

Together, we will design more cutting-edge academic spaces to deepen the learning experience for students and make an unforgettable first impression that reflects the innovation and excellence of a McDaniel education. We will establish endowed professorships in emerging growth areas. We will increase funding for facilities and coaching support within our Athletics program. And, just as importantly, we will seek increased unrestricted giving, which allows the college to respond nimbly and effectively to emerging needs and opportunities.

In addition to our philanthropic goals, we will forge 2,500 new community connections and create 500 new career connections by May 31, 2028. These goals are bold, and they should be. 




PRESIDENT JASKEN AND 2025 GRADUATE HONORED AT TOP 100 WOMEN AWARDS CELEBRATION

President Julia Jasken was named to The Daily Record's Top 100 Women list for the second time in recognition of her professional accomplishments, community leadership, and mentorship. She was honored during the award's 30th anniversary celebration alongside Janiah Fields '25, a Psychology major who was the winner of the 2025 Top 100 Women Scholarship.



JACK D. ARNAL SELECTED AS BOEHLKE FELLOW

Psychology Professor Jack D. Arnal is the 2025 Charles A. Boehlke Jr. Engaged Faculty Fellow. The fellowship is awarded to faculty in recognition of their exceptional commitment to their students, not only in classrooms and research labs but also with career and internship experiences.

Arnal has taught in the Psychology department since 2009. As a cognitive psychologist, his research focuses on human behavior and, particularly, memory processes. He also studies metascience and has involved McDaniel students in several research projects in this area.



STATE GRANT TO DEVELOP NEW ACCELERATED TEACHER TRAINING PATHWAY AT McDANIEL

A nearly \$100,000 grant from the Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC) supports McDaniel's "Transition to Teach" project, aimed at providing teacher licensure for individuals who already hold a bachelor's degree, with an emphasis on conditionally licensed teachers and career changers, including displaced federal workers.

The project addresses teacher shortages, while supporting new career paths, and expands McDaniel's existing initiatives to address Maryland's growing need for qualified teachers.



NURSING PROGRAM RECEIVES TWO FUNDING AWARDS

In recognition of her excellence and expertise in nursing education, Nursing Program Director Heather Gable (pictured above) received a \$5,000 Academic Nurse Educator Certification award for achieving the National League for Nursing's Certified Nurse Educator (CNE) credential.

McDaniel is also one of 13 nursing programs in the state to receive a Competitive Institutional Grant from MHEC, to support professional development opportunities focused on teaching and learning practices, course development and design, and academic collaboration and leadership, for McDaniel's nurse educators.





RECENT-ALUMNI TRUSTEES JOIN McDANIEL COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Two alums have been appointed as the first recent-alumni trustees on the McDaniel College Board of Trustees. They were selected by current trustees from alumni who graduated in the past 15 years to serve as representatives on the board. The new alumni trustees, who will serve one three-year term, are Lucero Espinal '20 (top) of Westminster, Maryland, who graduated with a bachelor's degree in Spanish and a minor in Education with a PreK-12 specialization, and Tim McLister '13 (above) of Leesburg, Virginia, who holds a bachelor's degree in Business Administration and Economics.

GRANT SUPPORTS NEW CAMPUS SAFETY ENHANCEMENTS

McDaniel College received a \$375,000 grant, part of the \$18.75 million awarded to Maryland colleges and universities through the Maryland Higher Education Commission's Campus Safety Grant program. The grant funds on-campus security enhancements at McDaniel, including adding electronic access devices in seven campus buildings and new closed-circuit television security cameras.

TOP MARYLAND TEACHERS HAVE TIES TO McDANIEL

Two of Maryland's top teachers for the 2025-26 school year have ties to McDaniel College's Graduate and Professional Studies programs. Carroll County Teacher of the Year Amy Glascock (below left) achieved National Board Certification through McDaniel's first cohort of a three-semester graduate course sequence and is currently teaching as an online adjunct lecturer in the program, while Calvert County Teacher of the Year William Voshell M.S. '23 (below right) holds a master's degree in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL).







McDANIEL EARNS MILITARY FRIENDLY® SILVER AWARD, NAMED MILITARY SPOUSE FRIENDLY SCHOOL

Once again, McDaniel College has been recognized among the nation's top schools for military and veteran students by earning a Military Friendly® Schools designation with silver status for the 2025-26 academic year. To earn the silver award, McDaniel scored among the top 20% out of more than 1,800 participating schools nationwide. McDaniel has also been selected as a Military Spouse Friendly School for supporting military spouses in pursuing their educational goals.

SENIOR EARNS GILMAN SCHOLARSHIP TO STUDY ABROAD

Hira Khan (pictured at right), who is a Biology major with minors in Chemistry and Arabic, is among 3,500 undergraduate students selected from 17,000 applicants nationwide by the U.S. Department of State to represent the United States as a Gilman Scholar. She is studying in Hong Kong during the fall 2025 semester.

"I decided to study abroad because I want to further develop my intercultural competence and gain new experiences in a different part of the world," Khan says. "In addition to taking science courses, I plan to study Mandarin Chinese while I'm there."



CREATING SPACES FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

HELPING OUR STUDENTS REACH NEW HEIGHTS ON AND OFF THE HILL

Since 1867, McDaniel College's liberal arts education has emphasized intellectual breadth, cultural understanding, rigorous discovery, and purposeful goal setting for life after college. Maintaining our high standards of academic excellence and innovation requires ongoing investments in faculty, facilities, and student-faculty research.

With the support of our donors through Reaching New Heights: The Campaign for McDaniel College, the college will ensure McDaniel's academic experience continues to evolve to meet the demands of today's best and brightest students.

Modern, purpose-built facilities play a significant role in providing a high-value learning experience that is rich in quality, collaboration, and discovery. The renovations highlighted here represent just the beginning of the new look on the Hill, but the college needs your support to make the rest reality.



A NEW HUB FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

THE LEARNING COMMONS @ HOOVER LIBRARY

This fall semester, students were welcomed back to the Hill with a new home for student success, academic excellence, and innovation: The Learning Commons @ Hoover Library. The renovations to the library began at the end of the fall 2024 semester with the goal of creating a one-stop shop for all student support needs.

"This innovative hub brings traditional library services together with IT, Student Success and Support, the Writing Center, STEM Center, and Student Accessibility and Support Services in a centralized location," says Christine Moran, associate vice president of student success. "The convergence of these services provides a thriving ecosystem, streamlining support mechanisms for students, providing a holistic and convenient approach to fostering academic and personal growth, and ultimately equipping students for success."

These upgraded facilities not only enhance the current student experience but also provide a tangible and compelling representation of the quality of a McDaniel education to prospective students and families who will carry the college's reputation for academic excellence and innovation into the future

"The Learning Commons @ Hoover Library represents McDaniel's commitment to integrated student support and academic excellence," says Provost Flavius Lilly. "By uniting our key resources and services in one space, we create a collaborative environment that enhances learning and empowers every student to succeed."

The \$3.6 million renovation was supported by donors including current McDaniel trustees Charles A. Boehlke Jr. '78; Marjorie Rankin Kimble M.Ed. '86 and Jeffrey Kimble M.Ed. '84; Millard Mazer '83; and Robert Pick '92, P'25; along with James Francis '84 and the late Jean Andrews Richards '45 and Donald Richards.



STUDENT ACCESSIBILITY AND SUPPORT SERVICES (SASS)

Student Accessibility and Support Services (SASS) has long been housed in Merritt Hall, but with approximately 30% of McDaniel undergraduate students utilizing SASS accommodations, the office had outgrown its physical space.

SASS works collaboratively with students, faculty, and staff to advance students' independence, self-advocacy, and full academic potential while enhancing educational outcomes and promoting the recognition of students' capabilities.

"As the director of SASS since 2014, and a member of the staff since 2011, I've witnessed firsthand how our students become self-advocates, scholars, and young professionals, with lasting memories of their home on the Hill," says Melanie Conley, director of SASS.

Now, students registered with SASS will have easier access to other support services like the Writing Center, STEM Center, librarians, IT, student success coaches, and academic deans, all of whom are frequent collaborators with SASS staff.

"The fresh openness of the new SASS space invites students to take full advantage of all the wonderful supports we offer while creating an accessible college community," Conley says.

Iris Levandoski '27, who is a tutor in both the Writing Center and the STEM Center, is eager for this collaboration to improve thanks to a shared physical space. "Last year, the SASS office and the centers began working together to offer tutoring tailored to students with additional learning needs. While students in the SASS program were able to benefit from the new resource, there were still times when communicating objectives, ideas, or progress via email made reaching a common goal a little difficult," she says. "Having SASS just across the rotunda will allow for students to receive even better academic support because our location will no longer feel like a barrier to success."


The new SASS computer lab and testing center in the Learning Commons is fully equipped with brand-new computers, private testing pods, and more accessible seating spaces with noise reduction, privacy features, and security for testing integrity.

"We've found that the environment makes all the difference in students' willingness to access their support services," Conley says. "With an accessible, appealing, and friendly environment, SASS aims to make students of all abilities feel comfortable and welcome."

Take a peek inside some of the vibrant new spaces in the Learning Commons! Light-filled spaces provide ample opportunity for student collaboration, and the private, accessible SASS computer lab and testing center ensure students with disabilities are set up for success.

WRITING CENTER

Fostering further collaboration among academic support services, the Writing Center has a new home in the Learning Commons @ Hoover Library, with a modernized facility in a central location.

Iris Levandoski '27 is the only dual tutor who works in both the STEM Center and the Writing Center, so her unique perspective on the opportunities provided by both services has her eager for the integration this academic year.

"The McDaniel Plan is designed to combine subjects like math, writing, science, philosophy, and even food studies to give students unique perspectives to the world," Levandoski says. "I was trained as a Writing Center tutor first, and at surface level, it seems really odd to have a Computer Science major for a writing tutor. But I need writing just as much as I need math to be successful."

With the new Learning Commons @ Hoover Library, Levandoski says, "I am thrilled to have the ability to physically combine the two worlds of critical thinking into one space. Switching from quantitative thinking to qualitative thinking will be as simple as switching to a different tab in my browser."

Writing Center Director Vanessa Flora-Nakoski looks forward to serving students in a more integrated way than they were able to in their previous location in Hill Hall.

"Our hope is that this new hub of services will make it easier for students to quickly and seamlessly get the help they need at all stages of their academic growth, whether that's when they want to get ahead, stay on track, or catch up after a setback," Flora-Nakoski says. "The tutors and I are very excited to have more space and options for fostering our community of McDaniel writers, building on our long-standing tradition of

welcoming, cozy vibes for both academic and creative writers here on campus."

Writing Center Tutor Morgan Holtzman '27 echoes those sentiments: "Our previous location was out of the way for many students, but the library is a central, accessible location for everyone. The new location will enable more students to use our services at the center, and the tutors are looking forward to being able to serve more students in the upgraded space!"

STEM CENTER

Although Trustee Bob Pick '92, P'25 studied History and Political Science on the Hill, he has always made his living in the technology sector, bringing the world of STEM closer to his heart. "I have directly observed the value that a liberal arts education can deliver in an increasingly STEM world," Pick says. "I have been struck by how frustrated some students were in feeling that their academic interests and passions would be a barrier to success in a STEM society. Donating to provide the STEM Center in the new Learning Commons @ Hoover Library is our direct action to alleviate this concern."

Pick says that he and his wife, Heather, were eager to donate to this project because it establishes a visible STEM pillar in the center of campus. "The liberal arts, in many respects, are all about 'and.' It's not one discipline or the other; one culture or another. It's about navigating all," he says. "The STEM Center and Learning Commons underscore that all disciplines, methods, cultures, learning styles, and workways are welcome, available, and supported at McDaniel."

Professionally, Pick has spent more than 11 years at Tokio Marine North America Services, where he currently serves as executive vice president and chief information officer, with responsibilities for technology strategy, delivery, IT, and business operations across the U.S., with more than 1,000 technology staff in the U.S., India, Costa Rica, U.K., and Europe.

In addition to donating to establish the new STEM Center, Pick has also recently engaged with Provost Flavius Lilly and a network of fellow alumni to re-envision the Computer Science curriculum on the Hill.

"Asking alums in a field to provide insight is a great example of the strength and sophistication of our academic programs," Pick says. "There are notable trends in what hiring managers in this industry are seeking: understanding of modern engineering languages and methods; awareness of cybersecurity and cloud technologies; experience and understanding of user experience design; awareness of data architectures and engineering; and recently, experience with classic and generative AI. Turning the curriculum slightly away from math and toward experience with these modern methods and platforms will prepare students for early success in tech."

This innovative emphasis on STEM programs and careers is a cornerstone of the new vision for McDaniel, and the college is grateful to donors like the Picks for making it a reality for students pursuing fields that truly represent the liberal arts and sciences.

BOB PICK '92, P'25 TRUSTEE



NURSING, OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY, AND SPEECHLANGUAGE PATHOLOGY

Inherent in our pursuit of academic excellence and innovation is transforming health care education in our region through the development of new Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.), Master of Science in Occupational Therapy (M.S.O.T.), and Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology (M.S. in S-LP) programs. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics estimated that the growth in these three careers between 2024 and 2034 would range from 5% to 15%, so to support that workforce demand, McDaniel aims to make a lasting impact on the community's health and well-being.

The success of these programs depends not only on hiring top-tier faculty but also a commitment to hands-on, practical learning housed in modern facilities that are equipped with simulation laboratories, state-of-the-art technology, and classrooms designed specifically for health care education to

create an immersive learning environment that mirrors the rigors and realities of the health care field.

Rather than spending tens of millions of dollars on new construction to house these new academic programs, the college is proud to use existing resources and partnerships to maximize our return on investment.

By 2026, the B.S.N. program will be officially based out of Carroll Hospital in The Kahlert Foundation Nursing Education Center, thanks to a landmark partnership between the college and LifeBridge Health and a \$2.5 million grant from The Kahlert Foundation. "While there are numerous examples of medical systems that are affiliated with large universities, it is unique for a college to partner with an existing system in this way," said President Julia Jasken at the announcement of the partnership last October. "We are eager to create a new model

designed to create a long-term solution to address the critical need for nurses."

McDaniel's Nursing students will have access to Carroll Hospital's state-of-the-art facilities, including the Kahlert Foundation Simulation Center, and be provided early and frequent exposure to clinical work within a hospital setting.

Here on the Hill, construction has begun on renovations in Merritt Hall, which will be the new home of the OT, S-LP, and Early Childhood Education programs. The space will be fitted with new simulation labs, classrooms, and even a mock apartment for OT students to learn how to set up patients for independent living.

INVESTING IN McDANIEL'S BUSINESS LEGACY

Renovations to upgrade the Economics and Business Administration Department in Lewis Recitation Hall took place over the summer. Built in 1914, Lewis Recitation Hall was the first building constructed on campus following a plan developed by the Olmsted Brothers landscape architecture firm and is named for President Thomas Hamilton Lewis, who served as the college's president from 1886 to 1920.

"This renovation will provide our faculty and staff with a welcoming, inviting space that will truly showcase our business program and makes an incredible difference for current and future McDaniel students," said Provost Flavius Lilly.

Funding for the over \$600,000 project is entirely supported by donors, including Professor Emeritus of Economics and Business Administration Ethan Seidel and McDaniel Trustee Deborah Dale Seidel '84; James M. Lamont '80 and McDaniel Trustee Karen Bellamy Lamont '81; McDaniel Trustee Walter Olson and Steve Pippin, parents of Timothy Olson '23; Rand Blazer '72; and the late Raymond Albert '62 and Linda Albert.





THE RIPPLE EFFECTS OF CONSISTENT GIVING

HONORING OUR 2025 FOUNDERS AWARD WINNERS

Barbara Payne Shelton '70 and Gordon Shelton '68 were both attending graduate school in the 1970s, living mostly off Barbara's stipend, when they were approached for the first time by staff at McDaniel College about making a gift to the annual fund.

"At the time, we were spending about \$15 per week on groceries, so a \$25 gift was fairly substantial for us at that point in our lives," Barbara says about the first gift they made to their alma mater. "We haven't missed a year of giving since."

While they have long since made the transition from annual giving to major gifts, the Sheltons — the recipients of the 2025 Founders Award — are proof that what may seem like small gifts can add up over time.

"We were honored to be recognized as this year's Founders Award winners, but we did think twice about accepting the honor," Barbara says. "Ultimately, we thought that maybe it would motivate some of our peers and friends to give more to the college."

And the Sheltons know that while all alumni may not be able to give at the Founders Society level, they reinforce that every gift — of time, talent, or treasure — has the potential to change a student's life.

"You never know when you're going to bump into somebody who might be interested in the college or might have money that they're looking to donate somewhere," Barbara says. "I can't tell you how often my McDaniel tag on my car has started conversations with prospective students and their families."

The motivation behind the Sheltons' decades-long giving track record? "If you enjoy something, let it show," says Gordon. "It will in turn nourish you as well. Barbara and I both have a variety of educational experience, but McDaniel was the best by a mile."

Both Sheltons say the community they found on the Hill is a major contributor to their continued engagement with the college. Gordon has been a volunteer class reporter for *The Hill* magazine since 1975, and anyone who has read his Class of 1968 column knows the lore of The Crab Guys. Each month, a group of about 10 (or more) classmates from the late 1960s and early 1970s get together to catch up over crabs and Natty Bohs.

"Forming small groups and staying connected with classmates over decades is so special and fun in this community," Gordon says. "It encourages people to contribute and remember the good stuff."

As for Barbara, she has been a member of the Round Robins since her first year on the Hill, when she met her lifelong best friends in McDaniel Hall. She was a founding member of the original McDaniel Women's Leadership Network, which has recently been revitalized under President Julia Jasken's leadership, and has served on the college's Board of Trustees since 2009.

"One of the things that has always made me want to give back to the college is because it gave so much to me," she says.

Over six decades, the Sheltons have prioritized philanthropy to the college, but they have diversified their giving to many different causes on the Hill. From the McDaniel Women's Leadership Network Endowed Scholarship Fund to The Shelton Adjunct Faculty Recognition Endowed Fund, one-off gifts to capital projects like the Roj Student Center and the Home on the Hill food pantry, or The Gordon '68 and Barbara Payne '70 Shelton Student Research Fund, their giving has touched students and faculty in myriad ways. But they say the gifts that have meant the most to them have been those designated for scholarships.

"A lot of our friends at the college were on scholarships, myself included, and it made us realize that there were a lot of people who couldn't have the McDaniel opportunity if somebody didn't help them," Barbara says. "So, giving to the college — and especially to scholarships — is a way to pay it backward and pay it forward at the same time."

"The future of McDaniel under the Reaching New Heights campaign is going to be bright," Gordon says. "And we're proud to play a role in that success."

FOR NINE WOMEN KNOWN AS THE ROUND ROBINS, COLLEGE TIES CAN NE'ER BE BROKEN

Since meeting in McDaniel Hall in 1966, the Round Robins have remained connected through the decades with monthly book club gatherings, weekly Zoom cocktail hours during the COVID-19 pandemic, and annual getaways. In April this year, they gathered once again to honor one of their own after the passing of Patricia Johnson "PJ" Krantz '70.

"We have reached that point in our lives ... and then there were eight," wrote Barbara Thomas '70.

The legacy of the Robins will continue here on the Hill through a generous bequest, including an endowed scholarship and Round Robins memorabilia to be placed in McDaniel Hall.

In addition, Krantz left an Itzchak Tarkey watercolor painting titled "Café Society" to the college. She was drawn to it because of the number of women in the painting: nine, the number of Round Robins in her friend group, which included Susan Robertson Cline '70, Carol Harris Dietrich '70, Sherry Swope Peck '70, Jane Butterbaugh Shapiro '70, Barbara Payne Shelton '70, Karen Wagner Tegges '70, Barbara Thomas '70, and Sue Morales Yingling '70, M.S. '00.

"Every time I look at the painting, I think of eight wonderful women and cherish our friendship — this picture honors them," Krantz wrote in her bequest intention in 2015.

"I think a lot of people take for granted the value of what they got at a small college like McDaniel," says Trustee and Round Robin Barbara Payne Shelton '70. "The lifelong friendships we formed at McDaniel are such a huge part of our lives."



PEOPLE ARE STRONGER TOGETHER, SAYS NICKI JAMES '26

HOW PHILANTHROPY HAS GUIDED ONE SENIOR'S McDANIEL EXPERIENCE

HOW HAVE YOU FOUND A SENSE OF COMMUNITY BELONGING HERE ON THE HILL?

It sounds funny to answer a question about community by saying that I found community in showing up alone, but I did. I made it a point to get involved in as many things as I possibly could — even if it meant showing up by myself. And that's where the best part happened. By showing up alone, I met people, tried new things, and found myself in a community based on genuine interest, curiosity, and connection. McDaniel's size makes it the perfect environment to build multiple communities. In a lot of larger schools, community is formed within academic departments and majors. On the Hill, you definitely form a community within your major, but most professors and staff know students by name, even if they're not in their department or major. Whether it's in the new Learning Commons or at an event like Out of Darkness, McDaniel provides the perfectly sized space for small interactions that can turn into strong relationships.

WHAT IS THE BENEFIT OF THE McDANIEL WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP NETWORK TO CURRENT McDANIEL STUDENTS?

The greatest benefit of the Women's Leadership Network is the way it has given me support that is specific to the issues women may experience in leadership roles. For example, at the Women's Leadership Network event last fall, we gained practical skills for how to deal with imposter syndrome. In the spring, we learned about the importance of prioritizing our own health.

AS A STUDENT, WHAT IS THE IMPORTANCE OF PHILANTHROPY AND DONORS TO THE McDANIEL EXPERIENCE?

I wouldn't be at McDaniel or have had access to any of the opportunities and experiences I have had in college without the generosity of donors, especially through experiential learning grants. Events like the Scholarship Luncheon, Founders Day Reception, and the 1867 Challenge generate awareness of what's possible through philanthropy.

New things pop up on campus all the time, but when students aren't aware that donors are the reason we have things like the Learning Commons @ Hoover Library, or a new track, or renovated offices, we take them for granted.

Last semester, I took a Social Work course where we learned about how nonprofit organizations function. We had the opportunity to hear from Vice President of Institutional Advancement Dave Sears, who explained how much work his staff does to fund everything from summer research to the new BSU Clubroom to scholarships to major renovations. That class opened my eyes to the importance of donors and fundraising.

WHAT DO YOU WISH YOUR PEERS KNEW ABOUT PHILANTHROPY?

I wish my peers had opportunities to learn about philanthropy from the business side of it, as well as the human side of it, because it would open their eyes. I take every chance I can to thank donors, because their generosity has allowed me to attend McDaniel and have life-changing opportunities before I have even graduated. I love being able to show donors that their gifts matter and change lives, and I hope I can make them proud with taking the opportunities they have made possible for me.

FINDING FULFILLMENT IN **VOLUNTEERISM ON THE HILL**

WHY ALUM OF THE YEAR NUPUR PAREKH FLYNN '94 THINKS THE SKY IS THE LIMIT FOR McDANIEL STUDENTS

Entrepreneur, philanthropist, and 2025 Alum of the Year Nupur Parekh Flynn '94 says that generosity is simply a part of her DNA. Whether that's through her service on the McDaniel College Board of Trustees from 2007 until 2011, her work with United Way of Central Maryland, her tenure as a trustee of the Baltimore Museum of Art, her stints coming back to the Hill as a guest lecturer, or serving as a mentor for the Innovation and Entrepreneurship Challenge, Flynn says that giving back in whatever ways she can "is just the most fulfilling part of life."

"McDaniel represents an enormous milestone in my life; college is such a critical pathway into adulthood," Flynn says. "I'm happy to give back to the college because these young people at McDaniel have the most brilliant ideas, and they're so full of life."

Flynn is the founding owner and CEO of Nupur LLC and the inventor of BAGCEIT®, a portable seat for purses and bags of all types designed to keep them off the floor and unsanitary surfaces.

The recipient of the 2020 Alumni Community Service Award, Flynn remains committed to giving back — both to her community and to McDaniel students. She was named the college's 2025 Alum of the Year for her commitment to supporting McDaniel's life-changing educational mission and programming.

The most recent opportunity Flynn had to see this firsthand was at the 2025 Innovation and Entrepreneurship Challenge, where she served as the alumni mentor for senior Sana Askari. Askari is a Political Science, Business Administration, and Arabic and Middle Eastern Studies major from Ghazni, Afghanistan. Her pitch was for Esheel, a social enterprise that supports women refugees by providing employment opportunities through their skill in creating hand-embroidered scarves and earrings, using embroidery techniques indigenous to and deeply rooted in Hazara culture.







Flynn recalls being "blown away" by Askari's story, poise, and passion for her work, and was thrilled to see her take home the first-place prize and tie for the People's Choice prize at the competition, "not because of my advice, that's for sure," she says

Askari would disagree with that sentiment.

"My alumni mentor, Nupur, who brings an international perspective, was especially helpful in guiding me through the different aspects and importance of registering Esheel," Askari says. "Her insights not only strengthened my presentation but also provided valuable direction for my work moving forward. She transferred a lot of her business knowledge to me that I will cherish forever."

Flynn and Askari's mentoring meetings were conducted virtually, and while Flynn could not attend the competition in person, she watched the event via livestream. She recalls being impressed by all the students competing for the top prize, marveling that they were "light-years ahead of where I was at that age. I didn't start my own company or invent anything until I was already retired from my career in finance and in my mid-40s. These students are doing it now as young adults."

Flynn credits McDaniel with putting the effort into connecting current students with alumni mentors who can help them find their path, but she emphasizes that in many ways, the alumni stand to gain more than the students from these relationships.

"When I volunteer at McDaniel, I hope I'm engaging to the students, but I know that I am super engaged by them," Flynn says. "I'm the true winner in these interactions, and I'm so excited for those of us who are going to be the recipients of this generation's innovation, ingenuity, and fearlessness that is being fostered at McDaniel."

FROM REFUGEE TO GREEN TERROR FOR LIFE

SANA ASKARI '26 CREDITS McDANIEL'S ALUMNI WITH UPLIFTING FAMILIES AND GENERATIONS, STARTING WITH HER

Senior Sana Askari's mother was not allowed to get an education, so each day at McDaniel, she is proud to honor her mother's sacrifices by pursuing her own education. Askari grew up as a refugee from Afghanistan with few resources, and today, women in her home country lack access to education beyond sixth grade. Without being named a Dorsey Scholar, Askari may not have been able to change her family's narrative. Thanks to the financial and personal support of alumni and donors, Askari has found a true sense of belonging and started a new chapter for herself, her siblings, and women back home in Afghanistan. She shares her experiences — and the lifechanging influence of McDaniel's alumni network — in her own words.

HOW HAS PHILANTHROPY MADE YOUR McDANIEL EXPERIENCE POSSIBLE?

I grew up as a refugee with no resources, and today, women in my home country have no access to education beyond sixth grade. If it were not for the generosity of donors, I would not have been able to attend McDaniel and pursue my education. Having witnessed my mother struggle to raise her children as a refugee and seeing other refugee women suffer due to a lack of opportunities, I became determined to change my circumstances and create a path for my younger siblings to pursue education.

What I wish my peers and others better understood is that philanthropy, whether small or large, has the power to change lives. My life is living proof: this scholarship not only transformed my future but also opened doors for my younger sisters to pursue their education. The impact of philanthropy extends beyond individuals; it uplifts families and generations.

ASIDE FROM YOUR MENTORING RELATIONSHIP WITH NUPUR PAREKH FLYNN '94 DURING THE INNOVATION AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP CHALLENGE, WHAT OTHER ALUMNI OR DONORS HAVE YOU INTERACTED WITH?

I had the privilege of meeting my scholarship donor, Mary Lynn Durham '70, who is funding the Dorsey Scholarship. It felt very special to meet the person who is enabling me to get an education, especially during a time when women and girls in my country, Afghanistan, are not only barred from education but also stripped of their basic human rights. Knowing that someone who does not even know me believes in my potential and is supporting my education strengthened my commitment to continue empowering women through my company, Esheel.

HOW HAVE YOU FOUND A SENSE OF BELONGING HERE ON THE HILL?

McDaniel has been my home for the past three years. I arrived on campus with only two suitcases and a dream of pursuing an education. What I have found here is so much more than an education — I have found a true sense of belonging. I am surrounded by a community of people who consistently support me, whether it is staff members like Amanda Gelber or professors who never fail to root for my success. Their encouragement has made me feel seen, valued, and uplifted, and it reminds me every day that I am not alone in this journey.

WHAT IMPACT HAS THE ALUMNI NETWORK HAD ON YOUR EXPERIENCE AS A STUDENT AT McDANIEL SO FAR?

The alumni network has had a tremendous impact on my experience as a McDaniel student. The support I have received extends far beyond what words can fully capture. One special example is my relationship with Alex Ober '63 and his wife, Jan Engle Ober '73, who have truly become like family to me. I first met them at an Alumni Association dinner, and from that moment, we developed a meaningful relationship.

Living alone and far from my family, I often face challenges that go beyond academics, such as moving between dorms and summer housing. Alex and Jan have always been there for me — helping me transport my belongings and making sure I never felt alone. Their kindness and generosity are a reflection of the alumni network's impact, which reaches well beyond professional connections and directly touches students' lives in deeply personal ways.

WHAT DO YOU ENVISION WHEN YOU THINK OF McDANIEL COLLEGE REACHING NEW HEIGHTS AS AN INSTITUTION?

I envision McDaniel as an institution that continues to change lives and open doors for students like me, enabling them to pursue their dreams and make a meaningful impact in their communities. The opportunities McDaniel has given me have not only transformed my own life but also the lives of my younger siblings and the students I have mentored over the past three years — students who have gone on to create positive change in their communities. This is the kind of far-reaching impact I see McDaniel achieving in the future.


IN MEMORIAM

TRUSTEE EMERITUS M. LEE RICE '48, HON. SC.D. '83

Trustee Emeritus and former Board Chair M. Lee Rice '48, Hon. Sc.D. '83 of Westminster, Maryland, died on June 11, at the age of 99. For over 40 years, he dedicated himself to supporting the mission of the college with generosity and compassion.

After serving as an electronic technician in the U.S. Navy during World War II, Rice earned a bachelor's degree in Mathematics and Physics on the Hill. The college later honored him with an Honorary Doctor of Science in 1983.

He engaged in graduate studies in mathematics and operations research at the University of Maryland, College Park, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Graduate School from 1948-54.



A scientist-turned-executive professional, Rice holds many patents, including the co-invention of the solid propellant rocket system for the Polaris missile and a meteorological sounding rocket, now displayed at the Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum.

He started out in 1950 at Atlantic Research Corporation as a mathematician, became a rocket scientist, and ended his tenure there as president. In 1960, he earned a National Capital Award for Outstanding Young Applied Scientist of the Year.

Rice went on to serve as vice president and later president of the Ogden Corporation and transitioned to president and CEO of Ogden Transportation Corporation. In 1980, he earned a Maritime Award from The Marine Society of the City of New York. After retiring in 1983, Rice was president of the Shipbuilders Council of America for three years and developed his own consulting firm. His last professional role was as president of Green Sea Ventures.

Across nearly three decades, Rice served on over 10 alumni committees at the college. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees from 1980-2005, chairing the board from 1991-96, and continued to serve as a trustee emeritus after 2005, including chairing the largest and most successful capital campaign in the college's history.

In 1996, Rice supported restorations to Peterson Hall and named the Esther Prangley Rice Gallery after his late first wife. Along with his second wife and McDaniel President Emerita Joan Develin Coley, he supported the renovation of Coley Rice Lounge in 2022. His most recent contribution, in 2025, was to the Education Department in honor of Professor Emeritus Skip Fennell.

For his volunteerism, philanthropy, and love for the college, he earned four alumni awards: the Meritorious Service Award in 1998, Alumnus of the Year in 2000, a Trustee Alumni Award in 2004, and the 2024 Founders Award.

Rice was born July 16, 1925, in Washington, D.C., and grew up on a farm in Montgomery County, Maryland. He was a keen photographer and built his own photography studio, which he donated to McDaniel College.

He was predeceased by his first wife Esther Prangley Rice, sister Ann Rice Jett '44, cousin W. Kelley Rice '49, and his cousin's wife, Eileen Weeks Rice '49. He is survived by his wife Joan Develin Coley; his four children, Joseph Rice, Helen Rice Summers, Stephen Rice, and Lawrence Rice; as well as his stepson, David K. Coley. He leaves 10 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.




IN MEMORIAM

PROFESSOR EMERITUS OF ART WASYL PALIJCZUK

Professor Emeritus of Art Wasyl Palijczuk of Philadelphia died on May 1 at the age of 90. He taught on the Hill for 38 years, from 1967 until his retirement in 2003, though he continued to teach part time until 2005.

His long legacy of artistic influence and mentorship benefited many artists over the years, and he shared his fascination with life and art with all who met him. He never wanted to be only an artist, because he cherished how teaching brought variety to his life.

On the Hill, he taught painting, drawing, printmaking, and sculpture, and was chair of the Art Department for 18 years. He led January Term courses on the Ukrainian Experience, Experimental Art, Furniture Refinishing, and a study abroad trip to Egypt.



His impact remains visible on campus today. Most notably, he sculpted the eight-ton granite sculpture in the Benson Sculpture Garden of the Hoover Library patio, and created "The Welcome," a 10-foot steel sculpture that invites visitors onto campus by WMC Alumni Hall.

He established The M. Louise Shipley Art Award of Excellence in 1973 to recognize outstanding graduating senior Art majors, and he also established the Wasyl Palijczuk Art Award in 1995 to recognize exceptional junior Art majors.

His artwork appears in over 500 private and public collections. Inspired by nature, he used photography, paint, wood, stone, steel, bronze, and found objects in his art.

Off campus, he judged countless local art shows and taught at various institutions, including the Baltimore Museum of Art, Jewish Community Center of Baltimore, and Maryland Institute College of Art (MICA).

He graduated from the University of Maryland, College Park (UMD), with a Bachelor of Arts in Art and Education. He was the first person to graduate from UMD with a Master of Arts in Sculpture. He later earned a Master of Fine Arts with a fellowship from MICA's Rinehart School of Sculpture.

Palijczuk was born in 1934 in Dzhuriv, Ukraine, and endured the upheaval of World War II. Living in impoverished conditions, he learned to draw using mud and charcoal. He moved to the United States at the age of 15 and graduated from Baltimore City College High School with honors. He served for four years as head technical illustrator in the U.S. Air Force's intelligence division.

His lifelong love for art propelled him into professorship on the Hill. After filling in for a professor on sabbatical, he was so loved by students that they created a petition with over 300 signatures asking the college to keep him on. He was quickly hired as gallery director, full-time instructor, and department chair.

He was predeceased by his wife Oksana Palijczuk and is survived by his daughters Ksenia Scorsolini and Natalka Palijczuk, and grandchildren Sophia and Mateo Scorsolini.
