

# A NEW FOCUS ON STUDENT SUCCESS

In June 2022, McDaniel kicked off the fiscal year by introducing a new position, hiring Christine Moran, Ph.D., as the inaugural associate vice president of student success. In her first year at the college, she worked closely with Academic Life, Residence Life, and Financial Aid to increase the college's retention rate to 76%, a 5% increase over the previous year and a 1% increase over the pre-pandemic rate.

A new student success management system was implemented in the spring, which allows advisors to view a student's profile and connections to faculty and staff. It includes success trackers that map which courses the student has to complete by a certain time to graduate, and includes early alerts or notes from faculty and staff that can inform student outreach. This software will allow McDaniel to deliver truly effective support and empower our students with timely information and tools.

#### IT STARTS WITH US

Professional development was offered throughout the year for faculty and staff to better understand their roles in student success. In the spring, Academic Life partnered with the Wellness Center, the Center for Experience and Opportunity, and Financial Aid on four student success presentations:



# PLAYING A ROLE IN THE BLUEPRINT FOR MARYLAND'S FUTURE

The Faculty Grant Award was presented to retired Associate Dean of Graduate and Professional Studies Daria E. Buese and Coordinator of the Master of Science in Teaching Tracey Lucas for a \$1.8 million Maryland State Department of Education Teacher Collaborative Grant. The grant will support a partnership with Carroll County Public Schools and Carroll County Education Association to establish the Lead Teacher Academy Collaborative, a comprehensive and multifaceted model for professional growth and advancement that is fully aligned to the priorities outlined in the Blueprint for Maryland's Future.

# PASSING ON A LEGACY OF SCHOLARSHIP AND SERVICE

Inherently, those who go into the teaching profession — particularly at the college level — have a desire to pass along a love of learning, service, and critical thinking to their students. The McDaniel Commitment is the guiding force in building a community of excellence that fosters students who are career- and life-ready before they leave the Hill. The college's commitment to this community of scholars is evident through the experiences provided to our students even before their first day of classes, from the McDaniel Local orientation experience that welcomed first-year students from 21 states and 10 countries — 40% of whom are first-generation college students — to opportunities to expand their professional and personal development throughout the academic year. The Center for Experience and Opportunity (CEO) has committed to developing programming both inside and outside the classroom to ensure all McDaniel students are ready for life beyond college.

Of course, many students take advantage of the opportunity to get ahead of the competition in the post-college job market with experiential learning, making them engaged, global learners. Throughout the year, **94 students studied abroad in 11 countries**, gaining experience in how to survive in an increasingly globalized world.

The commitment to creating life-changing experiences for students wouldn't be possible without the support of our alumni and community partners. During the summer of 2022, 10 students completed Summer Intern Fellowships, supported in part by a generous gift from The Rupe-Stuart Internship Award, courtesy of former Board of Trustees member Mark Stuart M.S. '94 and Timothy Rupe, and The Nora Roberts Foundation.

**CAREER-READY GREEN TERRORS** 

As part of the McDaniel Commitment's My Career curriculum, alumni are brought right to students in the classroom to share guidance and advice to help them get a leg up as they pursue careers or graduate school. In addition to **63 alumni conducting resume reviews** for students during the academic year, students learned about topics such as **leveraging their liberal arts degrees**, maintaining their personal brands, nailing the interview, and building their professional networks — all from their built-in network of Green Terror alumni.

Over the course of the year, students had ample opportunities to attend other career programming planned by the CEO, including virtual job, career, and graduate and professional school fairs; Prepped and Ready Workshops; Senior Bootcamp; panel discussions; and industry showcases. Nearly 2,000 students attended these events, making connections for their future careers, practicing interview skills, learning strategies related to specific industries, and even having the chance to "shop" for free business attire with the Pop-Up Career Closet. Alumni chapters held clothing drives resulting in more than 800 articles of clothing donated by staff, alumni, and community partners.

In the weeks leading up to the Virtual Job & Internship Fair, eight alumni facilitated workshops intended to prepare students on resume development, overcoming imposter syndrome, and navigating virtual events. The week prior to Commencement, 17 alumni provided live resume reviews and networking during Senior Bootcamp.

## **RESEARCH ON DISPLAY**

The college held its **Second Annual Academic Symposium on May 1, 2023**, which gave faculty and students an opportunity to show off their research to the McDaniel and Westminster communities.

Throughout the day, more than **50** presentations by **62** faculty members and **244** students were held. Many of the presentations showcased the diversity and intersectionality of a multidisciplinary liberal arts education. With the presentations covering **28** different disciplines, community members had a chance to learn from a variety of experts in areas that may have been entirely new to them.

This year also saw the addition of the first annual Service Fair, sponsored by the CEO. More than 100 community members completed over 600 mini service projects to benefit 25 local community partners.

## **CULTIVATING COMMUNITY**

More than 470 new employer contacts were recorded, expanding the professional network available to our students. On Handshake, the college's job searching platform, more than 58,000 experiential learning opportunities from 1,776 employers were approved over the course of the year, with 71.3% of those being jobs and 25.3% being internships.

Whether through efforts in diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice (DEIJ), access to mental health support, or the overall safety of the campus and the city just outside of it, the college aims to cultivate a community of care where each student, employee, alum, and friend feels safe and welcome.



# CREATING A CAMPUS HOME FOR ALL

Over the course of the 2022-23 academic year, the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (ODEI) hosted or co-hosted nearly 60 events on campus, including community meals, tabling events, guest speakers, and movie and book discussions.

- The ODEI Book Series transitioned into a DEIJ learning community with 40-70 participants each semester.
- The Cultural Speaker Series brought four leaders to campus to share about their cultural backgrounds and identities.
   Featured topics included Hispanic/Latinx heritage; LGBTQ+ rights, disability justice, and fatphobia; Native American heritage; and autism and neurodiversity.
- The office refocused on support for faith and religious communities throughout the year. **Interfaith celebrations** featured faith-based clubs and organizations and invited faith leaders from the surrounding community to join.

#### **NEW LEADERSHIP**



# CAMPUS SAFETY'S FOCUS ON COMMUNITY

Campus Safety continued the Officer/Residence Hall Liaison Program, in which each officer is assigned a residential area of responsibility for outreach through community-based, non-enforcement interactions. They were also expected to get to know all the resident assistants in their area and serve as a resource to them. There was a continuation of Cook-out with Campo, which was attended by approximately 700 students, giving students an opportunity to get to know Campus Safety officers and invited guests from Westminster Police Department in a positive, casual, non-enforcement atmosphere.

#### **NEW ENGAGEMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

In collaboration with the Student Government Association, Campus Safety organized a self-defense class for students. The class was conducted by several Campus Safety officers who are certified self-defense instructors. Beyond campus, Chief Eric Immler participated as a member of the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce Public Safety Awards planning committee. This county-wide program recognizes all departments and levels of public safety, including police, fire, EMS, campus safety, and prosecutors for outstanding work within their respective communities.



### **PUTTING MENTAL HEALTH IN FOCUS**

As is the case across the nation, mental health support calls have increased over the last few years on the Hill. At McDaniel's Wellness Center, six full-time staff members conducted **2,065** appointments in **2022-23**.

#### MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Over the course of the year, the Wellness Center proved how valuable mental health services can be on a college campus. Among the reasons for seeking counseling, the top three included anxiety (78.2%), stress (62.5%), and depression (53.5%), with self-esteem, family problems, academic performance, panic attacks, relationship problems, attention difficulties, and sleep problems rounding out the top 10. Of the 329 students who received services, 82% of clients experienced improvement in their presenting problems at the end of treatment. Additionally, 90% of clients said they were more likely to stay at McDaniel after receiving services.

#### **INCREASING ACCESSIBILITY**

To allow more students to reap the benefits of wellness in their lives, the Wellness Center put a new emphasis on psychoeducational workshops on topics such as coping with anxiety and stress, finding motivation, practicing self-compassion, and utilizing art therapy skills. Additionally, the "Let's Talk" program introduced students to informal counseling consultations with weekly hours at the Roj Student Center and in Gill Center for student-athletes. A new partnership with

Carroll Hospital's Tevis Center for Wellness led to a "Taking Care of You" series, hosting sessions on nutrition, stress management, yoga, guided meditation, and ergonomics.

#### STUDENTS SUPPORTING STUDENTS

The Griswold-Zepp Award is given each year to a current student for proposed volunteer experiences addressing the needs of local, regional, national, or worldwide communities. The 2022 winner of the award was junior Sydney Hinnant, who worked in partnership with McDaniel's Active Minds student organization, which is dedicated to promoting mental health awareness. Continuing this year, Hinnant created pop-up mental health spaces on campus, designed for students to de-stress and relax, as well as organized various events for students, including a meditation talk, yoga, making stress balls, animal therapy, and a question-and-answer session with the Wellness Center. The campus also rolled out the "YOU Matter" campaign in collaboration with Griswold-Zepp project leaders, where each month featured an event to foster a sense of community and belonging among students.



# COMMUNITY OF CHAMPIONS

A RENEWED FOCUS ON ATHLETICS



There is something special about athletics at a Division III school. When you wear the "M" as a student-athlete, you are in it for the love of the game, for the sense of community with teammates and fans, and to balance your life playing the sport you love while also pursuing your academics with passion and vigor.

A renewed focus on athletics brought the Hill championship bids, new faces on staff, upgrades for several facilities, and a slew of student-athletes proud to call themselves Green Terrors.


## **CHAMPIONSHIP-BOUND**

After the women's soccer team's first Centennial Conference championship win in 2021, the team qualified for the championship again in 2022 and hosted the quarterfinal round on the Hill. The team advanced to the semifinals at Johns Hopkins University.

McDaniel also sent Thomas Monn to the NCAA Wrestling Championship, where he finished in sixth place and earned All-America status. He was also recognized as the national Freshman of the Year. Nick Razze '23 went to the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships, where he finished 11th in the nation in the 400-meter hurdles.

#### **NEW FACES**

In 2022-23, McDaniel Athletics welcomed a new associate athletics director, assistant athletics director, director of athletics communications, head field hockey coach, and several assistant coaches. Talented professional staff members mentor and guide Green Terror student-athletes, cultivating success in the classroom and in sport.

#### ADDITIONAL HIGHLIGHTS


- Field hockey posted its highest win total since 2016.
- Men's soccer posted its highest winning percentage since 2005. McDaniel had three players earn All-Centennial Conference honors, including the program's first-ever all-region selection.
- The women's soccer team had five players earn All-Centennial Conference honors, three receive all-region honors and one named as an All-American. Two were named Scholar All-Americans.
- Ranked as high as No. 24 by the National Wrestling
  Coaches Association, wrestling placed second at the
  2023 Centennial Conference Wrestling Championships,
  its best finish since 2006 with four individual
  champions and eight place winners. The team had five
  All-Centennial Conference selections, including the
  Wrestler and Rookie of the Year, a regional champion,
  and the first freshman All-American in team history.
- Men's indoor track & field finished third at the 2023 Centennial Conference Indoor Track & Field Championships, had seven all-conference selections and a program-record six all-region honorees.
- Men's lacrosse finished with seven wins, the most since 2015.
- Men's outdoor track & field finished fourth at the 2023 Centennial Conference Outdoor Track & Field Championships and had seven all-conference selections. The team also won seven events en route to finishing first at the 2023 ECAC Division III Outdoor Track & Field Championships.
- Women's outdoor track & field won four events and finished fifth at the 2023 ECAC Division III Outdoor Track & Field Championships.
- Ryan McGarry '23 was named Centennial Conference
   Golfer of the Year and earned All-American status.
- Women's golf had its best finish at the Centennial Conference Championship since 2017.

# 3.15 CUMULATIVE GPA OF STUDENT-ATHLETES

#### STUDENTS FIRST, ATHLETES SECOND

At McDaniel, Green Terror student-athletes know that they are students first and athletes second, and that it is more than possible to succeed at both — it's expected. During the 2022-23 academic year, the cumulative GPA of student-athletes was a 3.15. Nearly 35% of Green Terror student-athletes were named to the Centennial Conference Honor Roll for maintaining a minimum 3.4 GPA. Forty-six student-athletes were named to their sport's Academic All-District teams.

In the Class of 2023, 24 student-athletes graduated with Latin honors, 10 earned departmental honors, and two were designated as College Scholars. Green Terror athletes pursue everything with passion on the Hill, as demonstrated by the three student-athletes who won academic awards and 11 who won activity and leadership awards at the Senior Investiture and Honors Convocation. Green Terror student-athletes were represented in honor societies such as Omicron Delta Kappa, Phi Beta Kappa, and the Trumpeters. They also demonstrate service to country, with four student-athletes receiving commissions as Army officers from the Green Terror Battalion.





# **EXPANDING COMMUNITY**

LIFE OFF THE HILL



As a Westminster resident herself since she began teaching at McDaniel two decades ago, President Julia Jasken has made it a top priority to reinvigorate a relationship with the City of Westminster and Carroll County. From hosting and participating in family-friendly events on campus and around town to taking a more visible leadership role around the county, President Jasken is leading the charge of **expanding** the Green Terror community off the Hill.



## INCREASING TRANSPARENCY AND ACCESS

In spring 2022, President Jasken began a series of informal virtual gatherings, "A View from the Hill," to provide current, emeritus, and honorary trustees with an opportunity to stay connected to what's happening on campus, no matter where they live. Providing updates on recent successes, upcoming initiatives, and an opportunity for feedback and questions, President Jasken is investing in the wealth of knowledge and passion for the college that lives in those who have committed to McDaniel at the highest levels over the years.

# CREATING A SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITY

In September 2023, the college officially unveiled the McDaniel Environmental Center (MEC), an outdoor learning lab developed by students to engage in hands-on educational opportunities in agriculture, conservation, and environmental sciences, as well as community building. The MEC consists of 30 acres of forested land, 20 acres of fields, and eight acres of student farming land. McDaniel received \$2.3 million from the State of Maryland to fund educational environmental spaces, both at the MEC and on McDaniel's campus. This includes renovations to the campus greenhouse and the transformation of Harvey Stone Pavilion into an outdoor living-learning laboratory.

The college also held its largest Earth Day celebration yet, featuring eco games, recycled crafts, live music, food, and more.

## **IMPROVED TOWN-GOWN RELATIONS**

President Jasken's senior leadership team and cabinet  $members \, have \, been \, integral \, to \, establishing \, and \, maintaining$ close relationships with the City of Westminster and Carroll County. The senior leadership team continued the annual breakfast on campus with the Westminster City Council, and cabinet members attended every city council meeting to ensure that the college remains actively engaged in the community.



## **TRADITIONS OLD AND NEW FOR THE HOLIDAYS**

Since 2011, McDaniel has partnered with the Boys & Girls Club of Westminster (BGCW) for its holiday party. In 2022, about 50 McDaniel student volunteers attended the party for more than 200 BGCW members.

A new tradition on the Hill was "Pie with the President," which stemmed from President Jasken's desire to host a holiday event with as many faculty and staff members as possible. On the last day of classes before Thanksgiving break, employees were invited to an open house event including mulled wine, coffee, hot cider, charcuterie, and holiday cookies. The event was made more special by a partnership with JeannieBird Baking Company, who supplied 117 pies for those who signed up to take a fresh pie home to enjoy with their families for the holiday.



## **INVESTING YOUR TIME, TALENTS, AND TREASURE**

Most of what was accomplished over the 2022-23 year would not have been possible without the McDaniel College community investing their time and money in the college that they hold so dear. In particular, the generous philanthropic support of alumni and friends totaling nearly \$7.2 million in new gifts and pledges made lasting impacts on current and future students.

The second annual One Hill, One Day (1H1D), was held on March 30 to celebrate the day the college's charter was approved by the State of Maryland in 1868. The community came together in a big way to show McDaniel students what it means to be part of the Green Terror family.

## A SPECIAL THANKS

The college's giving societies are a special way of recognizing the donors who have gone above and beyond in prioritizing the Hill with their philanthropy. In FY 2023, there were 234 members in the Founders Society. To become a Founder, donors must annually give \$1,867 or greater in honor of the year the college was founded. With 60% of fundraising dollars coming from members of the Founders Society, they supported 188 funds in FY 2023.

# BUILDING A COMMUNITY OF VOLUNTEERS

Part of being a Green Terror for life means finding ways to give back to the college that work best in your life. For many alumni, that may not be in the form of financial contributions just yet. But the time and expertise of the Green Terror network is always valuable here on the Hill.

McDaniel was honored to have **398 alumni volunteers for various events.** Among the most engaged alumni are the **101 members of the Alumni Council**, which spans class years from 1959 to 2022.

Looking to build this network even stronger, the Alumni Engagement team worked hard to identify others who are looking to re-engage with the Hill. The staff tallied **2,053 engagement actions over the year,** comprising phone calls, emails, and note cards.

Over the course of the year, **59 alumni events were held both** in person and virtually, with a total of **2**,646 attendees.



# YOUR GIFTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE EVERY DAY

Alumni, parents, and friends made a significant impact on students and programs through their philanthropy in FY 2023.

In terms of student success, donors supported scholarships for nearly 400 students. A generous donation from Don Rembert '61 and Judy Ellis Rembert '60 allowed the college to administer an aptitude and strengths-based testing pilot program on the Hill for more than 30 undergraduate students. Utilizing both the Abilities Potential and CliftonStrengths tests, these assessments helped students identify their natural, innate talents and learn how to further focus on and develop their strengths.

Expanded experiential learning in the forms of Jan Term and summer term student travel to Ireland and other parts of the world, as well as student-faculty research, were made possible by donors.

Green and Gold athletic donors played a critical role in providing team travel, coaching support, and equipment for the college's teams.

Donors also gave to support facility and equipment upgrades, such as new Biology Department equipment and classroom upgrades and renovations to Harvey Stone Pavilion.
